<u>Information for GPs/Private Hospital/Hospice: Medical Examiner office at</u> Barts Health

The statutory implementation of the medical examiner system will be enacted under legislation by the 9th of September 2024. It will then be a statutory requirement for all deaths within our jurisdiction of Tower Hamlets, Waltham Forest, Newham, and the City of London (Square Mile) not accepted for coronial investigation to be reviewed by a medical examiner before a Medical Certificate of Cause of Death (MCCD) is written.

GPs/Private Hospital/Hospice notified of deaths which occur at addresses in Tower Hamlets, Waltham Forest, Newham, and the City of London (Square Mile), which do not meet the requirements for coronial referral, will need to refer these deaths to the Medical Examiner office hosted by Barts Health NHS Trust.

The medical examiner service is not accountable to the hospital trust but is accountable to their professional regulatory body and the regional and national medical examiner.

What medical examiners do	Medical examiners provide independent scrutiny of deaths in cases not meeting the statutory criteria for coronial referral.
	 This includes: A proportionate review of medical records. Interaction with the doctor completing the MCCD. Explain the cause of death to the next of kin, establishing if they have any questions or concerns with the care before death.
Benefits to GPs/Private Hospital/Hospice	 Supportive death certification process. Fewer rejected MCCDs by registrar of births and deaths. Improves accuracy of information provided on MCCDs. Bereaved feel reassured that a death has been independently reviewed. Who are the medical examiner office team?	The team comprises of hospital specialists and GPs/Private Hospital/Hospice medical examiners, who have undergone training by the Royal College of Pathologists and
